

This is a hands-on demonstration of classes that have been offered by the USS Silversides Museum in Muskegon to over 10,000 students in the last eighteen months. These classes are STEM based educational experiences for people of all ages, experience levels and backgrounds. Participants will hear a short history of the uses of robots underwater, and then they will be divided into small groups to create, design and build a small underwater robot or Remotely Operated Vehicle (ROV) that they will drive in the hotel's pool. The teams will be given a mission to complete with their ROV.

A successful exhibition depends on the integration of a myriad of factors into a cohesive whole. The Institute of Museum and Library Services has adopted a new mission, vision, and strategic plan that will support its continuing efforts to assist museums in engaging communities in meaningful and creative ways. Learn about the intriguing investigation of the painting's provenance by MMA staff and Chase experts and why, despite their disappointing conclusions, the Museum's fondness for Tea Time has not diminished.
